

What Conflict of Human Heart is Reflected in the Poem “Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening”?

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In Robert Frost’s (1874-1963) poem “Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening” (1923), we see a deep struggle in the heart of the speaker.
