

In My Craft or Sullen Art Summary

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Summary:

The Poet's Work: The poet talks about his "craft" or skill, which is writing poems. He calls it "sullen" because sometimes it feels lonely or sad. He writes at night when everything is quiet. Even though they don't praise him or pay him for his writing, he continues to write for them, capturing their secret emotions.

The Poet's Purpose: The poet understands that the people he writes for, the lovers, won't praise him or give him money. They may not even notice his poems. But this doesn't stop him. He writes because he wants to express their hidden, deep emotions and connect with them through his poetry, even if they never realize it.
