People who lie walk like a snake—low and crooked. Bacon says lying is a shameful thing. A lie is brave against God, but weak in front of people. It means a liar is not respectful towards God, who knows everything. But, he or she is afraid of what people will think, so he or she tells lie to protect himself or herself. In the end, lies will bring God's judgment. Bacon warns that truth may be hard, but it is always the better path.
