

The Wife's Lament Summary

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The poem *The Wife's Lament* is a first-person monologue by a wife who shares her sorrowful story of exile and separation from her husband. She begins by expressing her deep sadness. The pain she feels from being alone is unlike anything she has experienced before.

The wife reveals that her suffering began when her lord (her husband) left their home and family. He sailed away to a distant land, leaving her behind.
